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Board of Directors Update

Your Egg Farmers of Alberta (EFA) Board of Directors would like to thank their fellow egg farmers, government and industry representatives, for making our January regional meetings such a success! It total, 111 registered producers (70%) attended, to hear updates on a variety of important topics and provide valuable feedback for EFA staff.

EFA's regional meetings touched on many topics of great interest to our industry moving forward. An update from our EFC Director indicated that their Board is working on a number of initiatives to reduce reliance on levy and improve overall business efficiency. Provinces will be receiving updates on the path forward sometime later this year. Timing of flock placements is of great importance, and some shifting away from December to early January would be quite beneficial to help us better supply the market and reduce the costs of our industrial product. As well, producers had the opportunity to relay topics that they wanted to discuss with the Board. Some of the more common discussion points revolved around SE testing and the policies for enriched housing, aviary and free run. Thanks to the EFA staff for putting together a packed presentation, full of relevant and timely topics.

Animal Rights Activism

EFC has asked all provinces to remind producers to be on their guard and remain mindful for activists and their devious methods, no matter how innocently these individuals present themselves when asking for employment or a farm tour. In addition to strict compliance with the Animal Care Program, by everyone working with your egg laying hens, EFC and EFA are also urging farmers to step up on-farm security by considering the use of additional outdoor lighting, by ensuring all access points to farm buildings are locked at all times and by completing thorough background checks on everyone applying for a job.

The reason for this reminder is a recent increase in activity by two of the animal rights groups operating in Canada: The World Society for the Protection of Animals (WSPA) and Mercy for Animals. These organizations are lobbying politicians, launching "choose cage-free" campaigns targeting consumers, publishing investigative "white papers" on hen housing and animal agriculture, requesting egg farm tours and, in some cases, sneaking onto farms to take undercover videos. EFC has heard concerns that have been raised about these groups potentially targeting the egg industry, in much the same way they recently targeted the pork industry (undercover video from a hog farm in Manitoba was shown as part of a W5 feature). EFC and EFA will continue to monitor the activities of these groups.

Field Statistics Update

The final 2012 numbers are in from the Start Clean – Stay Clean (SC-SC) and Animal Care Program (ACP) evaluations. Alberta's egg farmers demonstrated that providing safe, high quality eggs from hens raised with the highest standards of animal care is our industry's top priority!

 - ✓ Alberta's average score: 97.9%
 - ✓ 56 Alberta farmers have scored a perfect 100% rating

Producer Services Update

Quota – Important Deadline!

Do you still have quota in reserve from the September 2012 over base allotment?

The deadline for submitting written notification for the September 2012 over base allotment to EFA is **April 1**st, **2013**. Producers must notify EFA and submit signed paperwork by the deadline – either a lease agreement or reserve to issued form – or the over base allotment will revert to the EFA Board.

Note that the over base quota can remain in reserve until April 1st, 2014, but the paperwork for your quota activation must be submitted by the April 1st, 2013 deadline.

All producers who have not yet activated their over base quota allotments will be sent a reminder in early March, as a final notice.

EGG FARMING BEST PRACTICE

Disinfection without a proper cleaning job is a completely ineffective practice. Only items that are clean – meaning free of any visible debris or build-up and washed with detergent – can be disinfected properly.

BIO-SECURITY TIP

Maintain bio-security signs at the Control Access Zone (CAZ), on barns and any other restricted areas.

Top 10 SC-SC Corrective Actions from 2012

- Rodent control Monitor your traps and keep fresh bait available at all times. Record actions and results promptly in your SC-SC records.
- 9. Stagnant water Stagnant water can harbor salmonella and other contaminants. Keep the area around your production unit dry.
- 8. Production unit free of weeds and debris Keeping the area around the perimeter of your barn free of debris will prevent mice and wild birds from sheltering close to your production unit.
- 7. Annual water test A water test will confirm that the water you are providing to your layers is free from coliforms and other harmful contaminants. Send a water sample from your barn away for analysis at least once every 12 months.
- 6. Air intakes properly screened Ensure all air intakes and any roof openings are properly screened to prevent wild birds from accessing your production unit.
- 5. Gravel or asphalt barrier A 1-foot wide gravel or asphalt barrier around the outside of your production unit will help prevent rodents from accessing your barn.
- 4. Floor cracks Fill in all floor cracks wider than ¼" with durable material. This will prevent any bacteria build-up and pests such as darkling beetles from making a home in your production unit.
- 3. Feed supplier letter Keep an up-to-date letter from your feed supplier, which indicates that your feed is free from salmonella. This letter is required once a year.
- 2. Record feed consumption daily Recording feed consumption daily helps you to better manage your barn. Fluctuations in feed consumption are often one of the first indicators that there is a problem with your hens or your barn systems.
- All in / all out production This is the industry best practice for flock cycles, as it allows you to empty, clean and disinfect, and rest all of your facility at once. This can be an important step in controlling bacteria and pests in your facility.



Research Update

In the spring of 2012, EFA initiated a project with funding from ALMA to look at the use of layer manure in Alberta. This study, "Evaluation of Options for Alberta Layer Waste Utilization" found that layer manure was underutilized as a source of nutrients in agriculture and recommended that manure be upgraded to conserve nitrogen and to facilitate easy field application through implementation of pelletizing equipment.

As a result of this funding, a follow-up feasibility study was initiated to review the existing and potential market for pelleted manure products in Alberta, and estimate a volume and price point based on nutrient content and user benefits. A regional survey of products was undertaken that are currently in the market to establish their price parameters. As well, a survey was conducted to identify similar processed manure products in the market, both for bulk application and bag sales. Experts in the field of organic farming, fertilizer distribution or representing market opportunities such as golf courses and turf farms were interviewed.

Research has revealed that there may be a market with organic vegetable and grain growers who cannot use conventional sources of nutrients. Several interviewed growers were interested in the availability of a local product based on layer manure. EFA will now be looking at next steps which may include preparing a test product and conducting further economic analysis. Growing Forward Energy Efficiency Submeter Program

The Energy Efficiency Submeter program offers applicants financial support to install natural gas or electrical submeters. A submeter is an electricity meter (or gas meter) that is installed downstream of the main utility meter. They can be used to zero-in on energy usage that is of particular interest. For example, a submeter could be installed on an egg farm to measure electricity that is directly related to egg production. Electricity loads for residences and anything unrelated to eggs could be excluded. Since submeters measure only energy loads of particular interest, the information that they collect is more detailed and more accurate. This allows a manager to see how equipment is performing and analyze trends in efficiency over time.

The Energy Efficiency Submeter Program is currently available to all producers in Alberta who have at least \$10,000 in gross annual farm sales and/or an Alberta Farm Fuel Number, and who have not previously received payment from the program. The Energy Efficiency Submeter Program provides funds on a reimbursement basis on approved projects up to a maximum of \$2,000 per applicant. The Energy Efficiency Submeter Program is retroactive to the beginning of the Growing Forward program (commencing April 1st, 2009) for successful applicants. Applications to the program need to be submitted by March 15th, 2013. Applications should be submitted quickly as there is limited funding

Poultry Mortality Composting

Many Alberta egg farmers choose to compost their end-of-lay hens on farm. When done properly, composting is a low cost, environmentally friendly option that results in a valuable source of nutrients for your land. When done improperly, composting can lead to unpleasant odours, scavengers, disease spread and environmental risk.

In the September 2012 issue of *EggNotes*, proper composting techniques were reviewed. It is equally important to be aware of the regulations related to composting, under Alberta's *Destruction and Disposal of Dead Animals Regulation* of the *Animal Health Act, Appendix A*. Some of the key requirements under this regulation include:

- Dispose of animals within 48 hours of their death
- Open compost piles must be:
 - At least 100 meters from wells or other domestic water intakes, streams, creeks, ponds, springs and highway marks of lakes
 - At least 25 meters away from the edge of a coulee, major cut or embankment
 - At least 100 meters from any residences
 - Designed in a manner that will exclude scavengers
 - At least 100 meters from any livestock facilities, including pastures, situated on land owned or leased by another person
- The maximum volume of the animals in an open compost pile must not exceed 25% of the total compost pile
- Animals in the compost pile must be covered by at least 15 cm of composting material

Failure to meet these requirements under regulation can result in the engagement of ARD's Regulatory Services to follow-up on the issues.

ARD has developed a resource on Poultry Mortality Composting, which provides detailed information on planning, building and managing your compost piles effectively, as well as a detailed review of the regulations you must adhere to. EFA strongly recommends that producers who compost your end-of-lay hens should review this ARD manual.

ALBERTA EGG MARKET UPDATE

The Nielson preliminary retail sales data is available up to January 12th, 2013 and indicates that in the latest 4-week period, 2.9 million dozen eggs were sold in Alberta; a 10.9% increase from the previous 4-week period (ending December 12th) and a 7.7% increase in sales compared to the same period in 2012.

Nielson retail sales in the last 52 weeks are up 2.9% over the previous 52 weeks in Alberta. Specialty eggs (excluding Omega-3 eggs) have seen the largest sales growth in the last 52 weeks in Alberta; a 27.7% increase over the previous 52 weeks, to 1.8 million dozen eggs (5.2% of the total eggs sold in Alberta).
