Federal Supply Chain Act

The federal government recently implemented new legislation that requires certain companies to report on the measures taken to reduce the risk that forced labour and child labour are used in their supply chains. Under the Supply Chains Act (formerly Bill S-211), these companies are required to submit an annual report to Public Safety Canada each year.

Companies conducting business in Canada that meet two of the following conditions for at least one of its two most recent financial years must report under the Act:

\$20 million or more in assets \$40 million or more in revenue An average of 250 or more employees

Reporting via an online questionnaire must be completed by not later than May 31st each year. Failure to do so may result in fines up to \$250,000.

Third Party Auditor - Update

In the April issue of EggNotes it was noted that effective April 26, 2024, third-party audits in Canada will be conducted by MSVS Canada Inc and that the individual auditor(s) in Alberta would change. We have now been advised that the new individual third party auditor in Alberta will be Sandra Nesom. Please check the producer portal for a photo. As a reminder, auditors are required to carry government-issued photo ID.



From Your Production Management Committee (PMC)

EFA's PMC met on April 18, 2024. One of the agenda items related to flock health was Avian Infectious Coryza and topping up. Members of the PMC would like for producers to consider that:

- There are risks when topping up your flock. It is important that producers understand where birds are coming from and how many sources the birds are coming from. It is important to ask your hatchery representative or pullet grower these questions when considering a top up.
- Quota credits are available if you are short on pullets, it is important to consider this as an option as we have seen top ups bring in diseases that cause increased mortality and decreased egg production.
- If you are going to top up, consider contacting your vet for advice on testing and/or what diseases have been circulating recently. It can be very difficult to get rid of diseases once you test positive. When it comes to Coryza, the flock is considered positive until depopulated. This can add more problems if you have split flocks and/or pullets on the farm.

Reminder on Upcoming Changes to Feeder Space Requirements

There is currently a 5% tolerance in place for feed space per bird in conventional housing systems installed before the release of the Code of Practice on March 27, 2017. As such, it is acceptable for hens in conventional housing systems to have a minimum of 2.66 inches of feed space. As a reminder, this allowance expires on December 31, 2025, at which time the 2.8 inch requirement will come into effect. This applies to any birds which will still be in production at that time, even if placed earlier.

For the next leasing pool (2024/2025) changes in capacity up to December 31, 2025 were considered and some producers have already been reduced (on a future confirmed lease) depending on placement dates.

We ask that if you have a conventional housing system, you please take a moment to review your hen housing certificate prior to ordering your next batch of pullets to confirm whether you are impacted by the change from 2.66 to 2.8 inches of required feeder space.

Do you own a pre-2002 confined feeding operation? Article supplied from the NRCB

Help protect its future with a formal grandfathering determination from the NRCB Did your operation exist, or was it permitted by the county, before the Agricultural Operation Practices Act (AOPA) came into effect on January 1, 2002? If so, now is the time to request a formal grandfathering determination from the Natural Resources Conservation Board (NRCB).

Here's why:

Providing documentation for selling, refinancing, or expanding

- If you ever need to sell, refinance, or expand your operation, buyers or bankers will likely require documentation from the NRCB of your permitted capacity.
- Requesting a formal grandfathering determination now will allow you to start the process to obtain the documentation on your own terms and on your own schedule, instead of scrambling when you discover you need that piece of paper.

Records from 2002 are getting harder to find

- It's getting more difficult to find records from more than 20 years ago that prove the existence and capacity of your operation in 2002.
- Requesting a formal grandfathering determination now will allow you to start the process before even more time passes and it gets even harder to find records.

Shorter processing time

- The NRCB has dedicated resources in place until June 2025 to assist with your grandfathering determination request.
- Requesting a formal grandfathering determination now, while these resources are available, will help reduce the time it takes to complete the process. Without these dedicated resources a formal grandfathering determination can take up to eight months.

Clarifying your capacity

- You may be operating at a different capacity than on January 1, 2002.
- Requesting a formal grandfathering determination now will clarify the livestock type and capacity for which you are grandfathered.




Another successful event at Aggie Days Calgary!
